## PRESIDENT'S REPORT

With the APA Convention fast approaching, I'm dedicating this column to getting you up to speed on the amended SCP bylaws (which we will vote on at the APA Convention) and orienting you to some of the SCP activities that will take place at the Convention. I look forward to seeing you August 4-7 in Washington, DC!

Over the past year and a half, the SCP leadership has been engaged in a process of revising our bylaws. The revision was guided by the following goals and principles:

1. Streamline the bylaws to create a document that contains all necessary elements to govern the organization without unduly constraining our process with too many details regarding how we operate.
2. Move additional details regarding how we operate to the SCP Handbook.
3. Assure that the bylaws are consistent with our current practices or vision.
4. Assure consistency in use of terms (e.g., "Society") throughout the bylaws.

We started our process by asking a consultant who specializes in bylaws to review our current bylaws and make recommendations. Last year's presidential cabinet (Janet Helms, John Westefeld, Julia Phillips, Debbie Nolan, and I) started reviewing these recommendations

and updating the bylaws. This year, I appointed a committee (Linda Forrest, Janet Helms, John Westefeld, Debbie Nolan, and myself) to continue the work of updating the bylaws. We solicited input from SCP Past-Presidents and APA legal counsel, and the revisions have been endorsed by the SCP Executive Board. They are available online at <http://tinyurl.com/scpbylaws6-6-11>. Please let me know if you have any questions about the process or content. We will be voting on the revised bylaws at the business meeting at the APA Convention in August.

Speaking of the APA Convention, here are some anticipated SCP highlights you won't want to miss:

## VICE PRESIDENT FOR EDUCATION AND TRAINING REPORT

Since the last newsletter, I was happy to represent SCP at the APA Board of Educational Affairs (BEA) in March. During each BEA meeting, there is a break-out period where panels of specific constituent groups meet. One of these panels focuses on graduate education, and in the past this panel has addressed several challenging issues, including the complexities surrounding Master's-level education.

In March, 2011, the BEA graduate panel discussed the need to focus increased energy on the internship imbalance. This has, of course, been an on-going topic at BEA, as well as many other doctoral education meetings. This year, some important actions were taken. The graduate panel heard a request from the Council of Chairs of Training Councils (CCTC) to consider moving ahead with a recommendation that accreditation at the doctoral program, internship, and postdoctoral training (when part of a postdoctoral internship program) levels be considered the minimum training experience necessary for licensure as a health service psychologist. The BEA considered this request and made a statement affirming that APA/CPA accredited doctoral programs and internship training must be prerequisite to licensure. BEA subsequently forwarded a request to the Commission on Accreditation (CoA) to consider procedures that will facilitate internship programs seeking accreditation.

Depending on the outcomes of these statements and requests, there could be several implications for Counseling Psychology training programs and students. Casas** who authored the report on clinical issues for the APA Task Force on Immigration. In addition, Dr. Casas has published extensively for many years in the area of multicultural counseling. His most recent research and publication endeavors have focused on Hispanic families and children who are at risk for experiencing educational and psychosocial problems, including drug and alcohol abuse. His research in this area gives special attention to the resiliency factors that can help Hispanic families avoid or overcome

such problems. I am truly looking forward to hearing Dr. Casas present to us in this invited address titled: **Reactions to Immigration: The Basis for Implementing “Best Practice” Interventions** and I hope to see you there. Finally, our annual Practice Stakeholders Breakfast this year will again provide an opportunity for the issues of interest to SCP practitioners to be discussed so that advocacy can be planned. Issues that have been brought to my attention so far include advocacy for loan forgiveness for counseling psychologists, internship and post-doctoral training issues, and issues of reimbursement. Mark your calendars! The symposium **“Exploring the Connection between Health Disparities and Privilege”** is scheduled for **Thursday, August 4, 2011 from 2-2:50 pm** in the Walter E. Washington Convention Center, Room 102B.

In addition to the symposium and our regular business meetings, the Health Psychology Section is planning several other events in the Division 17 Hospitality Suite. These include 2 workshops.

One workshop will be **“Interprofessional Collaboration in the Medical Consultation Setting: Challenges and Opportunities”** led by Lara Stepleman, PhD from Georgia Health Sciences University. Psychological consultation within medical settings has become an increasingly standard practice that provides valuable opportunity to routinely interact with diverse health care providers and benefit from their distinct perspectives on patient care. This inter-professional collaboration can

be especially crucial to the management of health issues that frequently are treated across specialties such as depression, sexual functioning, and pain. Moreover, having psychological consultants within the medical setting can allow for timely problem identification, multidisciplinary treatment planning with patients and families, and swift triage to increase patients' likelihood of receiving appropriate mental health follow up when necessary.

One challenge to inter-professional collaboration is that psychologists and physicians (as well as other care providers) are trained and socialized into different professional cultures, which may be evident in views about health, methods of communication, and rules for interaction among others. This can be especially tricky for consulting psychologists to maneuver, given that we are usually operating within another discipline's domain. Using an intercultural perspective, this workshop will examine key elements for effective interprofessional collaboration, including skill building across the health professions that will optimally increase mutual appreciation and value of our diverse disciplines and improve patient care.

The second workshop is titled, "**Billing for Your Services: Managing Life with Managed Care.**" The purpose of the workshop is to present valuable information regarding CPT Codes and billing, third-party reimbursement, and effective documentation to enhance returns. In the healthcare era of cost containment, psychologists need assistance to maximize their service reimbursement. It pays to know the billing basics, whether you are wondering how to bill for a health and behavior assessment or when you are to bill for non direct care services (APA, 2011). The presenters will consolidate information on new requirements with existing code rules and discuss implementation of billing techniques to manage coding and billing and reduce claim rejections. The presenters will review commonly reimbursed CPT codes and necessary documentation; provide an update on the Health and Behavior Assessment and Intervention codes; and discuss the use of nontraditional services (e.g., telemedicine) and the reimbursement success in the current managed care climate. More details on presenters and date and time to come!

Also, during APA in the Division 17 Hospitality Suite, the Health Psychology Section will continue to focus on our stu-

dents interested in health psychology by offering our annual session on internships in health psychology settings.

Aside from APA planning, Brian Lewis, PhD, University of Miami (Chair-Elect) and I have been busy for the last few months on our project "Training and Research in Counseling Health Psychology: A Survey of Counseling Psychology Programs". As part of the project we conducted a survey of training directors to determine the scope of health training opportunities within counseling psychology programs in the United States. Ours sincere thanks goes to counseling psychology graduate students Trisha Raque-Bogdan, University of Maryland, and Carrie Torrey, University of Florida who are part of the research team and who have had leading roles on this project. Stay tuned for results of the survey!

Our biggest news is the relocation and re-scheduling of our biennial conference in the fall of 2011: *Forging Career Policy for the Greater Good*. Our original location in Madison, Wisconsin was great; trust me, I'm from Wisconsin. How can you improve upon that? Well, apparently, the spirit of Frank Parsons was at work; the conference will now be held at Boston University. So, the **Society for Vocational Psychology Biennial Conference** will be held in Boston, at **Boston University**, on **November 5th and 6th, 2011**. A Friday evening reception will kick-off the conference.

You may wonder, as people occasionally do, "Why would I attend the SVP biennial conference? I don't even remember my Holland code." Here's why.

Work is a central activity in human lives. The draft of the *Guidelines for Integration of Vocational Psychology into Professional Psychology Practice*<sup>i</sup>, now in circulation throughout divisions and boards of APA, articulate for applied psychologists and researchers the pervasive importance of understanding work across the lifespan. The SVP Biennial Conference will further enhance our efforts to communicate the importance of work in people's lives by extending our capacity in the arena of policy formation. The conference is designed to bring together a broad range of career development researchers, policy experts, and graduate students in order to strengthen linkages between federal policy and career development services. The keynote speaker for the conference will be Raimo Virunen, coordinator of the European Lifelong Guidance Partnership Network and researcher at the Finnish Institute for Educational Research at the University of Jyväskylä, Finland. Raimo will share his experiences in working with the European Union, and the communication efforts underway to highlight career development programs that are being implemented in member countries. The conference will also feature plenary addresses, concurrent sessions, and poster sessions.

Materials prepared by the conference steering committee provide further rationale for this timely conference, as follows: The conference theme is responsive to the fact that federal policies in the United States and in many countries around the world do not contain language related to the need to provide access to quality career development services. A variety of efforts are underway to bring attention to this issue. The Interna-

tional Career Development Symposium<sup>i</sup> has created a "Prove it Works" conversation thread and task group to evaluate the challenges and opportunities associated with creating a set of common evaluation metrics. The International Center for Career Development and Public Policy (<http://www.iccdpp.org>) is gathering a plethora of documents and papers related to career development and policy which is organized by country and theme. In the United States, a number of recent reports highlight the need to strongly consider adding career development policy language into upcoming reauthorizations of the Workforce Investment Act and the Elementary and Secondary Education Act. The report from the National Collaborative for Workforce and Disability for Youth to the U.S. Department of Labor titled *Comprehensive Career Planning and Its Role in the Competitive Global Economy* describes the critical importance of establishing a research agenda that can influence policy making efforts.<sup>ii</sup> More recently, the *Pathways to Prosperity* report by the Harvard School of Education and the *National Approach to Career Navigation for Working Learners* report from the Center for American Progress echo the critical need to address this topic.<sup>iii</sup> The European Union in many respects is moving quickly to implement the Organization for Economic Cooperation and Development (OECD) recommendations to increase lifelong access to quality career development services as a way of maintaining a competitive knowledge based economy.<sup>iv</sup>

### APA COUNCIL OF REPRESENTATIVES REPORT

Melba Vasquez, APA President and SCP/17 member opened APA Council, held February 18-20, 2011 with her Presidential projects including three Task Forces : Immigration, Preventing Discrimination and Promoting Diversity, and Addressing Educational Disparities. CEO, Norma Anderson, reported on the APA Strategic Plan listing 7 initiatives currently being “scoped out.” Sandy Shullman, SCP member and Ron Rozen-sky are co-chairing the Good Governance Project which is examining the effectiveness of structure of APA in serving our members. SCP/17 is well represented on this Task Force. Carol Goodheart, APA Past President and SCP/17 member reported on several new resources are now available to APA members including PsycLINK@apa.org, a practice Wiki; Care Giving Tool Kit, an on-line searchable website found in the Public Interest area of the APA website; and, PsycNET which includes 3 new data bases, PsycBOOKS, PsycCRITIQUES, and PsycEX-TRA in addition to PsycINFO and PsycArticles.

Two items generated rich discussion. Council approved an overall dues decrease of \$40 for all members and eliminated

all dual membership discounts with the exception of Canadian members. APA and CPA will bring a proposal in August. Likewise the motion to seat delegates from the four ethnic minority organizations was postponed until August to enable ongoing discussion of how those Council Representatives would be elected by the four organizations. Our Council Rep, Helen Neville and Board of Directors members, Jean Carter and Rosie Phillips Bingham, both SCP/17 members were actively involved in those discussions throughout the meeting.

Several excellent reports were received including Principles for Quality Undergraduate Education in Psychology, Classroom Violence Directed against K-12 Teachers, Guidelines for the Practice of Parenting Coordination, Revised Guidelines for Psychological Evaluations in Child Protection Matters, Guidelines for Assessment and Intervention with Persons with Disabilities, Guidelines for the Evaluation of Dementia and Age-Related Cognitive Change, and Guidelines for Psychological Practice with Lesbian, Gay and Bisexual Clients. These reports are well documented with up to date research and best practices. Please use them in your work. A joint task force was established to develop Telehealth Guidelines and we passed a resolution Affirming Psychologists’ Role in Addressing Global Climate Change. Finally, David Baker, SCP/17 member, gave an excellent report on the Center for the History of Psychology in Akron Ohio and Linda Campbell, and Terry Gock, SCP/17 members received Presidential Citations.

#### 2011 APA Convention

*Symposium/Workshop Exploring Privilege: A Didactic-Experiential Approach*  
*Saturday 10am-12pm*  
*Convention Center Room 158*

A symposium to be held at the 2011 APA Convention aims to assist counseling psychology students and professionals with exploring their own privilege through a mixture of didactic and experiential activities. Participants will be challenged to reflect on the specific ways in which they experience privilege culminating in developing strategies for exploring privilege beyond the convention.

#### **Conversation Hour**

A conversation hour is scheduled for the Hospitality Space as an opportunity for people to gather to explore privilege in a facilitated discussion. More information will be forthcoming once the date and time is identified.

#### **Privilege Guide to the Convention**

In addition to the above activities, a guide will be created cataloging all of the SCP programming at the Convention that will be focusing on privilege.

#### Exploring Privilege Video Project

As part of the Special Task Group (STG) on Privilege, we will be building a resource of videos about privilege. We will invite you to create short video clips describing your own experiences of privilege, which will be included in a permanent online archive available to members of SCP, APA, and others who are interested in this topic. Your stories can talk about early experiences as well as current experiences of privilege in your personal or work life. Videos should focus on how you first became aware of your privilege, the kinds of advantages you have as a result of this privilege, the feelings you have about having this kind of privilege, or how you have responded to your awareness of privilege. Privilege is comprised of unearned advantages that are conferred on individuals based on membership in a dominant group or assumed membership. Privilege has the following characteristics:

- Privilege reflects, reifies and supports dominant power structures.
- Privilege is supported structurally and systemically, including an investment in maintaining a lack of consciousness about the benefits and costs resulting from that privilege.
- Privilege is enacted through societal structures, systems, and daily interactions.
- A single individual may experience intersecting privileges and oppressions which may reflect differential receipt of benefits.

#### **I. Louisiana's Act 251: Emerging developments and concerns**

**Background:** In Louisiana's (LA) Act 251, the definition of "medical psychologist" (MP) is legally authorized and exclusive and as such, prohibits other practitioners in Louisiana from using the term. A key concern is that potential ethical problems arising from RxP practice will be reviewed by the LA Medical Board which has a different standard of ethical conduct than that of the LA Psychology Board. Furthermore, MP training now comes under the auspices of

the Medical Board and thus, may conflict with traditional psychology training standards. There is much that remains unclear. Note that the American Board of Medical Psychology (ABMP) president submitted a letter to the editor which was published in the March issue of the *Psychology Times* (Independent publication for LA psychologists). The letter notes that psychologists with prescriptive authority will not be able to keep their diplomate status active with the ABMP unless they retain their licensure under the Psychology board as well as the Medical board. According to the article there are currently over 30 ABMP diplomates and it is anticipated that about 15 will be lost due to this issue.

States/territories/federal entities that currently have RxP models: New Mexico, Guam, Department of Defense, Indian Health Service and Louisiana. States/territories that currently have pending legislation for RxP: Hawaii, Oregon, Ohio, New Jersey, Tennessee, Arizona, and Virgin Islands. At least two of these have the term “MP” in them – occurred prior to concerns raised by IHC, CAPP, BEA and BPA; one has removed the term.

In the course of discussion, the following issues were noted:

a) The Louisiana Association of Medical Psychologists (LAMP), which is the group that moved Act 251 through to its present state, is a registered PAC (Political Action Committee – organization whose sole purpose is to lobby); b) the Louisiana Medical Board has a subcommittee that regulates MPs and LAMP is currently responsible for nominating providers who will be on the subcommittee; c) MPs are required to obtain a minimum of 25% of their CEs from LAMP; d) CAPP, the oversight board of the APA Practice Organization, awarded a legislative grant to the Louisiana Psychological Association to promote RxP legislation and LPA used the same lobbyist as LAMP to represent their shared interests in RxP (before the current negative fallout).

Recent action by APA: APA’s CAPP has adopted a policy that they will no longer fund state RxP legislation efforts that use the term “Medical Psychology” or use models where prescribing psychologists place themselves under Medical Boards. Following our meeting in August, 2010, the IHC submitted a letter to the APA Ethics Committee expressing concern regarding Act 251’s mandate for licensing “Medical Psychologists” under the auspices of the LA Medical Board. The APA BOD is now forming a task force to look at the origins, process and outcomes of LA 251, including ethical issues. The IHC plans to write a letter to the BOD to request assurance that said task force reflects a cross-section of psychologists historically involved in medical settings.

#### II. H&B Codes – update

Use of the assessment code (96150) was down; Medicare may be restricting use in some areas. The hassle factor and

lower reimbursement than for 90801 remain issues. It was noted that anomalies exist in the private insurance sector. One major insurer has created an H&B billing code for “chart review” and has allowed for payment for this activity. Also, private insurers may require that a DSM code be used with H&B procedure codes. Members of the committee have been successful, however, using: Ax I: 799.90 (dx deferred), with Ax III: (*whatever appropriate*). (Note the code for “no diagnosis” (V71.09) being a “V-code” would not be reimbursed.) For relevant local information, psychologists should contact the major, request to speak with provider relations, and ask for a list of the covered procedure codes, including H&B codes.

#### III. Negotiations with UBH on reimbursement for neuropsychological testing

Representatives of Div 40, NAN, AACN and IHC have been in discussion regarding UHC decision that all authorizations/reimbursement for neuropsychological testing has been given back to UBH for management rather than management under medical benefits– this is a nationwide phenomenon. This policy goes against CMS policy in which neuropsychological evaluations are defined as a neurodiagnostic procedure and a covered medical benefit. The change in policy may have significant ramifications regarding reimbursement rates, which are lower for behavioral health services than for medical services. UBH administrators have said they are working on “customary and fair” reimbursement rates and reviewing on a case-by-case basis whether a service provided is more medical or behavioral. But it is unclear how this is being carried out and whether this process is effective. It may be that there is not much that can be done at this point with UHC/UBH decisions. NAN has developed a guide to assist providers in billing UBH-UHC (see attachment), but this may be limited help. #### IV. APA Priorities and the future

APA is focusing on getting psychologists included in federal definitions of “physician.” Key allies in the Senate (S. 483) and the House of Representatives have now introduced legislation to include psychologists in the Medicare “physician” definition. Inclusion would give the profession a better advantage in a range of negotiations.

The IHC is planning to have members initiate discussion with their respective divisions/sections to obtain thoughts on APA’s funding and advocacy priorities. After gathering this information, the IHC will draft a letter to CAPP to provide recommendations.

## EARLY CAREER PROFESSIONALS

### What Happened to All That “Extra” Time?

While working on my dissertation, I created a mental list of all the things I would do once I completed my doctorate. Guitar lessons, working my way down the New York Times best seller list, and completing a century bike ride topped my list. Currently, I’m without a guitar. I’ve only read a handful of page turners, and let’s just say Lance Armstrong has little about which to worry.

I earned my doctorate almost two years ago, and I often ask myself, “What happened to all that extra time I thought I would have?” I started wondering if other early career psychologists (ECPs) wrestled with this question. The hibernating researcher in me awoke (she went to sleep shortly after she defended her

dissertation)! I contacted my ECP friends and colleagues and asked the following questions: (1) Do you currently have the amount of free time you thought you would once you earned your doctorate?; (2) If you answered “no” to number one, what kinds of activities are filling up your “extra” time?; (3) How do you set healthy boundaries between work and personal life? and (4) Do you have good role models/mentors for this process in your workplace? A colleague from my intern cohort immediately messaged me, “I do have extra time, but I’m too tired to use it!”

Several themes emerged from my survey. Many ECP colleagues wrote about engaging in activities they “put off” while completing their doctorate. Home buying, starting a family, spending more time with family, and finding a permanent job consumed “extra” time. Shortly after celebrating the title of “doctor,” ECPs discussed focusing their efforts on accruing

postdoctoral hours and studying for licensure. ECPs in academia also engaged in activities to move them towards tenure – teaching, publishing, and advising to name a few. ECPs in practice assumed duties they were relatively immune from during internship – responding to after-hours crises, supervising, and carrying larger, more complex client loads than predoctoral trainees.

Our passion for psychology, ability to set and achieve goals, and time management skills allowed us to successfully navigate the demands of our doctoral programs. However, these gifts can also inhibit our ability to set healthy boundaries. For example, I mastered the skill of “worunching,” (i.e. working while lunching) during my postdoctoral fellowship. I admit this behavior with some embarrassment given I consider mindfulness an area of clinical interest! We accept an extra client or dissertation advisee, because we enjoy our work. We do more, because all too often culture defines our professional worth in terms of productivity.

Although many of my fellow ECPs indicated they were quite busy, many developed good self care strategies. Several wrote about having a physical activity regimen they followed each week. Others discussed keeping family time sacred. I stopped worunching and made a vow to take a 15 minute walk every day during lunch. (The university I work at overlooks Mission Bay!) One colleague, who is expecting her first child, discussed how she started limiting the amount of extra work activities she volunteered for. Several ECPs talked about maintaining a consistent spiritual practice. Some of my colleagues mentioned having good role models for keeping a healthy work life balance, while others heard messages such as, “Don’t work late like me . . .” from seasoned colleagues.

I encourage overwhelmed ECPs to take a moment to evaluate how they spend their time. What are you doing to refuel your emotional gas tank? Who can mentor you? Do you practice self care in a way that is congruent with the self care psychoeducation you provide clients and students? Do you have an ECP support system? If you initially responded by asking, “Do they make hybrid emotional gas tanks now?,” I hearten you to identify ways to care for yourself! Consider setting a small

goal for yourself this week to practice self care, find a mentor, and/or connect with ECPs.

One practical way to build your ECP network is to join us at the American Psychological Association (APA) Convention. We hope you can join us for some or all of the activities below!

- Applicant's demonstrated competence and capability to execute the proposed work
- Criticality of funding for execution of work (particularly if part of a larger funded effort)

- Description of proposed project to include goal, relevant background, target population, methods, expected outcomes  
Format: 5-10 pages (1 inch margins, no smaller than 11 point font)
- CV of the project leader
- Total cost of the project, including a detailed budget
